

FIRST READING

Lector A reading from Acts.

GOSPEL

Officiant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said, "Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly."

ABOUT THE MUSIC AND ART

At a glance, the art on the cover, *The Lord Is My Shepherd* by Eastman Johnson (1824-1906), depicts a man reading a Bible in solitude, coming to the scripture for strength, a scene to which we can all relate especially in these turbulent times of social distancing for the prevention of COVID-19. Johnson painted *The Lord Is My Shepherd*, oil on wood, in the spring of 1863, shortly after the Emancipation Proclamation on New Year's Day of that year. It is part of the collection at the Smithsonian American Art Museum, where its gallery description reads, "The simple act of reading was itself a political issue. Emancipation meant that blacks must educate themselves in order to be productive, responsible citizens. In the slaveholding South, teaching a black person to read had been a crime; in the North, the issue was not 'May they read?' but "They must read"" (<u>https://americanart.si.edu/artwork/lord-my-shepherd-11494</u>).

During that same year, our beloved sanctuary, in which we dearly miss gathering, was nearing completion. Taking cues from this image—of studying scripture, of basing our faith upon the Word, of following Jesus, our Good Shepherd, toward protection and liberation, let us consider: What do we miss? Where do we find strength and hope? Which social and political systems are out of balance, and how, as we yearn to return to our sanctuary and to other beloved places of community, might we seek the justice and health of every human being?

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
