1 Peter 3:18-22, The Message

Lector A reading from First Peter.

Christ suffered because of others' sins, the Righteous One for the unrighteous ones. He went through it all—was put to death and then made alive—to bring us to God. He went and proclaimed God's salvation to earlier generations who ended up in the prison of judgment because they wouldn't listen. You know, even though God waited patiently all the days that Noah built his ship, only a few of them were saved then, eight to be exact—saved *from* the water *by* the water. The waters of baptism do that for you, not by washing away dirt from your skin but by presenting you through Jesus' resurrection before God with a clear conscience. Jesus has the last word on everything and everyone, from angels to armies. He's standing right alongside God, and what he says goes.



And so, with the multitude from east and west, from north and south, with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven, we lift our voices in the unending hymn:

Holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

The Celebrant continues

ABOUT THE ART AND MUSIC

The art on the cover is from the installation *Noah's Ark: Genesis*, created in 1984 by Charles McGee (1924-2021). The materials are enamel and mixed media on masonite, and the 120"x180" piece is featured at the Detroit Institute of Arts. McGee's work, which includes murals and sculptures, is displayed prominently throughout Detroit. In a 2017 interview at the age of 92, McGee marveled, "I look at our world in awe and how it's all put together," and this fascination animated him throughout his seventy-year career, as he created art nearly every day of his life. In a 2008 interview, McGee said, "At that last moment of my life, I'll go out very happy because I feel like nature has given me a kiss of beauty that nobody can take from me."
