ABOUT TODAY'S LITURGICAL ART

The altar flowers are given to the glory of God.

The woodcut artwork on the bulletin cover evokes both today's Gospel reading, in which Jesus commends faith even as small as a mustard seed, and St. Francis of Assisi (c. 1181—3 October 1226) whom we remember today and who was known, in his reverence for all creation, to preach even to the birds. The woodcut is called *A Parable: The Mustard Seed* (2019) by the Rev. Cara B. Hochhalter, who writes:

"The kingdom (or 'kin-dom') of God, the realm of God, God's vision for justice and peace—is profuse. Jesus surprises his hearers by using a mustard seed as a metaphor. Everyone knew that mustard was invasive and one would never plant it in a garden. Perhaps Jesus is telling them that a tiny packet of God's yearning for peace has the potential to grow like a tree and even upset an order of oppression! If we nurture its growth, Jesus says that birds from many nations will long to come and build nests in its branches. For something even as small as a seed of love, can have transforming power and create an environment where others long to reside..."

The Rev. Cara B. Hochhalter is a United Church of Christ (UCC) minister. She received her Masters of Divinity from United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities in Minnesota, where she studied the intersections of art, theology and justice.
